PROCLAMATION: MARCH IS NATIONAL NUTRITION MONTH – The Mayor read the proclamation and presented it to ShopRite representative Jessica Guarnieri. Committeeman

Piserchia noted Partners in Caring had conducted a fund raising event and ShopRite employees Diana Gonzalea and Moemi Maridiago had won the contest for raising the most donations. Their pictures will appear on a Cheerios box. Additionally both women chose to donate back their \$250.00 prize money. The food purchased from the donations will go to the All Saints Church Food Bank.

Stephanie Cuthbert – Ms. Cuthbert of Remington & Vernick answered questions from the Township Committee regarding rate comparison data for the potential sale of the wastewater plant and collection system. The Committee directed Finance Director Ho to create a report which illustrated the rate increases that have occurred in other municipalities after an asset sale and how those increases compared to the increases seen in municipalities in which the utilities were overseen by BPU. They also wanted information on the costs which would be incurred to make the expansions needed in order to lift the sewer ban and costs associated with the upcoming increase in having to remove phosphorus and copper out of the system. Discussion ensued regarding the production of the Request for Bid proposal. Potential items to be included in the RFB were as follows:

- Lift Sewer Ban
- Achieving 100% sewer hook up
- Require residents to connect upon sale of a home
- Seek a specific financial commitment for capital improvements
- Pave curb to curb on streets where sewer connections/repaired are being done
- Senior Citizen discounts
- Rate freeze for a certain amount of time
- Interview (or retain) Current Employees

Resident Dennis Sandow recommended the Committee speak to an economist as well as the engineers to get a market perspective in addition to an engineering perspective.

COMMITTEE LIAISON REPORTS:

Committeeman Dorsi:

- In 2016, the Stirling Fire Department answered 258 alarms, conducted 92 hours of drills and used 9521.65 man hours. Please continue with your donations.
- There will be a water rescue drill at Stirling Lake at the end of next week.
- The Annual Venison dinner was a great success. All aluminum cans, etc. from the dinner were recycled. Please keep bringing your aluminum recycling so we can continue donating to the St. Barnabus Burn Unit.
- The DPW handled some downed trees after the wind storm of last week. They also cleaned up the Hicks Tract in preparation for the Girl Scouts upcoming camping trip. Two days of warm weather allowed for some pot holes to be filled. Mulch will be available in about a month. 9000 fluorescent bulbs were recycled. Please continue recycling your Styrofoam in 2016 the Township recycled 3.5 tons of Styrofoam which

would have gone into the land fill. The DPW did a great job handling the forced main break in Meyersville this week.

Deputy Mayor Rae: No report.

Committeeman Meringolo:

- The School budget will be out this week and will be brought to the Committee meeting next week for discussion.
- The Historic Preservation Committee is moving forward with the Tombstone project in Turtle Rock Park.
- The construction on the Old Town Hall is moving along nicely.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Township of Long, in the County of Morris, State of New Jersey, that the Township Administrator is hereby authorized to process an Involuntary Disability Retirement application for Police Officer Thomas Scala.

Officer's certification, the governing body has found the budget has met the following requirements:

- 1. That with reference to the following items, the amounts have been calculated pursuant to law and appropriated as such in the budget:
 - a. Payment of interest and debt redemption charges
 - b. Deferred charges and statutory expenditures
 - c. Cash deficit of preceding year
 - d. Reserve for uncollected taxes
 - e. Other reserves and non-disbursement items
 - f. Any inclusions of amounts required for school purposes.
- 2. That the provisions relating to limitation on increases of appropriations pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2 and appropriations for exceptions to limits on appropriations found at N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.3 et seq., are fully met (complies with CAP law).
- 3. That the budget is in such form, arrangement, and content as required by the Local Budget Law and N.J.A.C. 5:30-4 and 5:30-5.
 - 4. That pursuant to the Local Budget Law:
 - a. All estimates of revenue are reasonable, accurate and correctly stated,
 - b. Items of appropriation are properly set forth
 - c. In itemization, form, arrangement and content, the budget will permit the exercise of the comptroller function within the municipality.
- 5. The budget and associated amendments have been introduced and publicly advertised in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Local Budget Law, except that failure to meet the deadlines of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 shall not prevent such certification.
 - 6. That all other applicable statutory requirements have been fulfilled.

TOWNSHIP OF LONG HILL ORDINANCE 395-17 CALENDAR YEAR 2017 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 0.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Township of Long Hill in the County of Morris finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2017 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the governing body hereby determines that a 3.5% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$339,364.41 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS the governing body hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the governing body of the Township of Long Hill in the County of Morris, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively

concurring, that, in the CY 2017 budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of Long Hill shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$395,925.15 and that the CY 2017 municipal budget for the Township of Long Hill be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

FIRST READING/INTRODUCTION:

TOWNSHIP OF LONG HILL ORDINANCE #396 -17

MAKING THE PROPERTY MAINTENANCE CODE APPLICABLE TO PROPERTIES IN FORECLOSURE AND SUPPLEMENTING AND AMENDING CHAPTER XVI OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE ENTITLED "PROPERTY MAINTENANCE"

WHEREAS, vacant or abandoned buildings or structures can cause harm to the health, safety, and welfare of the community and its residents, including detriment to nearby properties, and increased risk of fire or public health and safety risks, and such vacant or abandoned structures may result in increased costs to the Township of Long Hill for police calls, fire calls, and property maintenance to protect the neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40:48-2.12a, N.J.S.A. 46:10B-51 and other statutes authorize and

permit municipalities to adopt an Ordinance to provide that the care, maintenance and security of vacant or abandoned structures upon which a Summons and Complaint in a foreclosure action has been filed shall be the responsibility of the foreclosing creditor, and to regulate the notification by foreclosing creditors to the Township; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to that authority, the Township Committee adopts this Ordinance to require such notification and assist and allow such responsibilities to be placed upon the appropriate parties so that the detrimental effects regarding abandoned and vacated properties may be reduced or mitigated;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Long Hill in the County of Morris, State of New Jersey, that Chapter XVI of the Township Code, entitled "Property Maintenance", is hereby supplemented and amended as follows:

Section 1. Section 16-1 entitled "Property Maintenance" is hereby supplemented and amended by adding a new subsection 16-1.3A entitled "Responsibilities of Creditor in the Case of Properties in Foreclosure" which reads as follows:

16-1.3A Registration and Maintenance of Properties Pending Foreclosure.

16-1.3A.1 Purpose.

The intent of this Ordinance is to provide for the enforcement of the Township Property Maintenance Code and other applicable law against and to vacant and abandoned properties pending foreclosure.

16-1.3A.2 Responsibility for Maintenance of Vacant and Abandoned Properties in Foreclosure.

A creditor filing a Complaint in a foreclosure action shall be responsible for the care, maintenance, security, and upkeep of the exterior of the vacant and abandoned residential property. If the creditor is located out of the State of New Jersey, the creditor must

appoint an in-State representative or agent to act for the foreclosing creditor.

16-1.3A.3 Service of Notice, Contents.

- A. A creditor filing a Complaint in a foreclosure action on residential property located in the Township of Long Hill shall, within ten (10) days of serving the Summons and Complaint, serve the Township Clerk with a Notice advising that a Summons and Complaint in a foreclosure action has been filed against the subject property. The Notice shall contain and include the information set forth in (C) below and shall be provided by mail.
- B. Any creditor that has filed a Complaint in a foreclosure action on any residential property which is pending in Superior Court shall provide to the Township Clerk with the Notice as described in (C) below for any residential properties in the Township for which the creditor has pending foreclosure actions.

C. The Notice shall state:

- (I) The name and contact information for the representative (located within the State of New Jersey) of the creditor who is responsible for property maintenance and will respond to Township communications regarding the property;
- (ii) Whether the property being foreclosed on is an affordable unit pursuant to the "Fair Housing Act";
- (iii) The street address, lot and block number of the property; and
- (iv) If the creditor is located out of State, the Notice should include the full name and contact information of the representative/agent located within the State of New Jersey authorized to act on behalf of the entity/creditor, accept service on behalf of the entity/creditor, and to receive and act on notifications regarding maintenance of the property in foreclosure.

16-1.3A.4 Responsibilities of Creditor Filing a Foreclosure Action as to vacant and Abandoned Property.

Any creditor having filed a Complaint in an action in foreclosure on a property, and that creditor having been notified by the Construction Code Official in writing that the property appears to be or is abandoned or vacant, shall be responsible within thirty (30) days of said notification as follows:

(I) Investigate and inspect the property as required to determine if the property is abandoned and vacant, and notify the Construction Code

Official in writing of that determination.

- (ii) Secure the building and structure on the property from unauthorized entry.
- (iii) Perform such appropriate repairs or maintenance of the exterior grounds of the property, including yards, fences, sidewalks, walkways, driveways as may be needed or directed by the Construction Code Official so that the property is free from trash, debris, or excessive grass or weed growth, or safety hazards.
- (iv) Continue to maintain the structures in a secure condition and the grounds in a clean, properly maintained state.

16-1.3A.5 Violation of State or Local Law at Property on List; Responsibility of Creditor.

If the owner of a residential property vacates or abandons any property upon which a Complaint in a foreclosure action has been filed or if a property is otherwise vacated and/or abandoned subsequent to the filing of the Complaint in a foreclosure action, but prior to the vesting of title in any third party, the foreclosing creditor shall have the responsibility to abate any nuisance or correct any violations of the Property Maintenance Code and applicable law in the same manner and to the same extent as the title owner of the property, to such standard or specification as may be required by the Property Maintenance Code or applicable law.

16-1.3A.6 Notification of Violation.

In the event of a violation of the Property Maintenance Code or applicable law, the Township shall serve the creditor with a Notice that shall include a description of the condition(s) that gave rise to the violation and shall provide a period of thirty (30) days, or ten (10) days if the condition presents an imminent threat to public health and safety as determined by the Construction Code Official, for the creditor to remedy the violation or condition. The creditor must remedy and/or repair the conditions noticed within the specific period.

16-1.3A.7 Repair by Township.

If the Township expends public funds in order to abate a nuisance or correct a violation on a residential property in which the creditor was given notice pursuant to §16-1.3A.6, but failed to abate the nuisance or correct the violation as directed, the Township shall have the same recourse against the creditor as it would have had against the title owner of the property including but not limited to the recourse in the Property Maintenance Code an applicable law.

16-1.3A.8 Enforcement.

The Code Enforcement officer is hereby authorized to enforce this Ordinance.

16-1.3A.9 Violation and Penalties.

Any person or corporation shall, upon conviction by any court having jurisdiction of a violation of this Section 16-1.3A, be subject to a fine not to exceed \$2,500 per day commencing as of the date after the expiration of the ten (10) day period provided in \$16-1.3A.3B. Any person or corporation upon conviction by any Court of a violation of \$16-1.3A.5 and/or \$16-1.3A.6 shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$1,500 per day, to commence thirty-one (31) days after receipt of the notice or, if the violation presented an imminent risk to public safety and health and was so noticed, commencing eleven (11) days after receipt of the notice.

- **Section 2.** A copy of this Ordinance shall be sent to the New Jersey Bankers Association.
- **Section 3.** Any and all other ordinances or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with any of the terms hereof are hereby repealed to such extent as they are so in conflict or inconsistent.
- **Section 4.** In case any article, section or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid in any court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect any other article, section or provision of this ordinance except insofar as the article, section or provision so declared invalid shall be inseparable from the remainder or any portion thereof.
- **Section 5.** This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law.

CONCERNING PARKING REGULATIONS ON SOMERSET STREET AND AMENDING CHAPTER VII OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE ENTITLED "TRAFFIC"

Statement of Purpose: To amend the traffic code by adding the south side as well as the dead-end portion of Somerset Street east of Main Avenue to the list of streets where parking is prohibited at all times.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Long Hill in the County of Morris, New Jersey that Chapter VII of the Township Code entitled "Traffic" is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1. Section 7-14 entitled "Parking Prohibited at All Times on Certain Streets" is supplemented and amended by adding the south side and the dead-end portion of Somerset Street east of Main Avenue, in alphabetical order, as follows:

7-14 PARKING PROHIBITED AT ALLTIMES ON CERTAIN STREETS.

No person shall park a vehicle at any time upon any streets or parts thereof described.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law.

Warren Ave Street Vacation
 As part of his Planning Board Site Plan Application, Mr. Wang needed authorization from
 the Township Committee to vacate a portion of Warren Avenue in order to increase the
 size of his parking lot. After a brief discussion, on motion from Committeeman Meringolo,
 seconded by Deputy Mayor Rae, the Committee unanimously voted to allow the
 vacation with the caveat that Township Engineer Ferriero confirmed with the Vision
 Committee that they had no plans to put trails in that area. Attorney Pidgeon will draw
 up the Ordinance for the next meeting agenda.

- Proposal for Program for Additional Garbage Pick Up In follow up to some residents reporting they were regularly exceeding their garbage amount, Administrator Henry had reached out to Midco and they are proposing to sell the Township 1000 30 gallon trash bags imprinted with the Township name. Residents can come to the Municipal Clerk's office and purchase the bags for \$6.00 each. These are for household waste only. There is no limit on the number of bags that can be put out each week. The Committee authorized the Additional Garbage Pick Up program.
- Tow Rate Increase One of the Towing Companies the Township uses has asked for the Township to update its rates as they have not been updated since 2009. The

Committee directed Administrator Henry to come back with information on rates from other towns so a decision can be made whether or not to increase our rates.

OLD BUSINESS/ADMINISTRATOR REPORT:

- The pre-application process for the Land Diversion is moving forward.
- The Vision Committee is gearing up to move forward with the trail plans and will be applying for grants shortly.
- Schoolhouse repairs are progressing nicely.
- The Administrator will be looking for new vendors that can handle the quarterly newsletter production.
- The sidewalk project for Northfield, Main and Central streets will start in April. The PD will make sure school pedestrians are safe.
- The 2016 Kantor Park Trail Grant will be ready for Bid shortly.
- The Land Use Efficiency Committee continues its work and has requested the Township Committee amend the escrow Ordinance to reschedule the application fees to \$1800.
- The Energy Audit is moving forward.
- The Valley Road water main replacement work is going smoothly.
- The first Traffic Advisory Committee meeting is scheduled for Monday, March 13th.
- On Mountain Avenue between Valley Road and Cottage the wattage of the streetlights will be increased from 50 to 100 to address pedestrian safety concerns.
- The search for a new phone system is progressing it is down to two systems and there will be a meeting later in March to pick the final system.
- Sponsor letters will be sent out to replenish the Promotional Enhancement budget.

NEW BUSINESS:

Committeeman Meringolo brought up a question from a resident of why the Rte 78 sign on exit 40 says Gillette and not Long Hill Township. The Committee decided not to petition the DOT to change it.
