# TOWNSHIP OF LONG HILL ORDINANCE # 430-19

# AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT AN OFFENSE TO INTERFERE WITH LAWFUL BUSINESS ENTERPRISES AND SUPPLEMENTING AND AMENDING CHAPTER III OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE ENTITLED "POLICE REGULATIONS"

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Township Committee of the Township of Long Hill in the

County of Morris, State of New Jersey, that Chapter III of the Township Code entitled "Police

Regulations" is hereby supplemented and amended as follows:

**Section 1.** There is hereby created a new section 3-16 entitled "Interference with

Lawful Business Enterprise" which reads as follows:

### **"3-16 INTERFERENCE WITH LAWFUL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE**

It shall be unlawful for any purpose to, without lawful purpose, unduly interfere with the business operations of any lawful business enterprise conducted upon its property or at its principal place of business, or to cause any undue expenditure of such business enterprise's resources thereat, within the Township of Long Hill. Any person found in violation of this section shall be liable to the penalties set forth in section 1-5 of this Code."

Section 2. Any and all other ordinances or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with any of the terms hereof are hereby repealed to such extent as they are so in conflict or inconsistent.

Section 3. In case any article, section or provision of this ordinance shall be held

invalid in any court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect any other article, section

or provision of this ordinance except insofar as the article, section or provision so declared

invalid shall be inseparable from the remainder or any portion thereof.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and

publication as required by law.

## MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC:

- Charles Arentowicz Congratulated Mayor Dorsi and Dep. Mayor Piserchia on being Mayor and Dep. Mayor for the upcoming year. He was concerned that the Township receive the best possible value for the potential sale of the wastewater system if the Town was going forward with another referendum to sell the plant. He was concerned with the large difference between the valuation price of the plant and the offer price in the first referendum. He recommended removing the requirement of the buyer to sewer the Town up to 95% as this was not practical.
- Maria McCoy, Gillette, stated she was against a second referendum and felt the Committee should listen to the will of the people when they voted the referendum down two years ago.
- Todd Sylvestry was concerned about the safety of citizens at the Gillette Train Station at night as well as concerned about the ice covering Milton Ave. The Mayor suggested the possibility of looking at solar lighting for the station.
- Roy Russen voiced concern about the icing on Milton Avenue, the high price of the police body and car cameras and also thought there should be lighting at Gillette Train Station.
- Tom Grosskopf thanked the Committee for reconsidering the lighting at Gillette Train Station and showed the Committee photos of ice covered Milton Ave. The Mayor stated that Milton Avenue is do for repaving in 2019 and before the paving the Director of DPW would meet with the Township Engineer to address the issue. Mr. Grosskopf also noted that recycling parameters are changing and was concerned with the increasing cost associated with these new parameters.

On motion of Comm. Meringolo, seconded by Comm. Rae and carried unanimously, the meeting was adjourned at 9:13 p.m.
