- Comm. Rae reported the Police had conducted 1266 Post and Checks, arrested 43 people, made 2150 motor vehicle stops and answered 11,982 self initiated calls year to date. He noted that Long Hill will be participating in National Night Out on August 6 at 6pm to 10pm at Kantor Park. Please come and participate!
- Deputy Mayor Piserchia no report
- Comm. Meringolo reported he had attended a Long Hill Emergency Planning Meeting that had a presentation by AT&T about their new network designed to help emergency communications, called First Net. The Township will be testing on the demo units and he will report back on the results.
- Mayor Dorsi no report

At 8:03 Mayor Dorsi called for a recess of the meeting in order to open the Public Hearing for the Operation and Management of the Wastewater Plant Contract. The regular meeting reconvened at 8:31pm.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

- 1. Sewer bills have been mailed. The increase was 12%. If residents have questions they should call the tax office, extension 221.
- 2. 3rd quarter tax bills will be late. Both the county and state still have to certify our tax rate.
- 3. Our paving program was moved up based on the contractor's availability. It was originally supposed to begin in August, then next week and instead it actually began today in Millington. The work seemed to be going slowly today, mostly due to the heat. Right now they are only milling, which can be done in the rain. Residents who live on the streets that are on the schedule should park their cars off the streets in anticipation of work. Residents should note that milling will be done first and then paving will begin about a week later.
- 4. As a result of the new paving schedule, work on the Stirling train station was moved up with short notice. When we found out yesterday that work on the lot would be closed tomorrow, we put flyers on people's windows to give them a heads up. We did not have alternate parking arrangements yet so we put another notice out today letting people know they could park in St. Vincent de Paul's lot at their own risk and as always they can park at the Millington train station lot. Paving of the Stirling lot is tentatively scheduled for Friday July 26th but is dependent on weather because paving cannot be done in the rain. If it is the 26th, the church has agreed to let people park there that day too. We will put out notices.
- 5. Morristown Road improvements will probably begin next week. The first week or so of work will not require closing the road; impacted residents will receive or should have already received a notification from Top Line Construction. When we get confirmation of the contractor's schedule, we will post the dates and detours on our website, FB and TV.
- 6. The bid for the new traffic light at the intersection of Valley Road and Mountain Avenue was awarded by the county. Work is supposed to begin later this month or early next month. Any information regarding road closures will be posted as we get additional information.

- 7. Ash tree removal will begin the first week of August. 263 ash trees will be removed in Long Hill; most tree stumps will not be ground. Police will provide traffic control.
- 8. We were notified by the county that New Vernon Road from Meyersville to the Township line will be paved in the next month or two, but we have no official date yet.
- We were also notified that Division Avenue from Valley to Long Hill, which was scheduled to be paved this year, will not be done; it may be done next year; county is waiting on NJT approval.
- 10. Applications for grants for paving of Old Forge, Main Avenue streetscape and the High Street bike path are being submitted but the application to the County for the Dogwood Terrace bike path was rejected because the area where the path would go has to be permanently preserved parkland and it is not.
- 11. We should be meeting with the residents of Cross Hill Road in September to go over the plan to fix their road.
- 12. Kantor park trail extension bid will go out again toward the end of August.
- 13. The Communication Advisory Committee has made a recommendation for new cameras for under \$10,000. This is only the first half of the project. If you ok me spending the money tonight, I can begin the process to make the purchase.
- 14. The Millington parking meter will soon be able to accept credit cards; after a few months, we will phase out cash altogether at this machine.
- 15. The drainage project on Milton Avenue should be completed by next week.
- 16. JCP&L installed a new pole and moved the electric service the other side of the tracks at the Gillette train station. Work to install the new lights should begin next month.
- 17. National Night Out August 6 6 pm to 10 pm in Kantor Park. Thanks to a grant from the Watchung Hills Municipal Alliance, our local emergency services, and the Parks and Rec dept will host this event this year. It is free for the community. Refreshments, games, a bounce house and giveaways are all included. At 8 pm a free movie in the park will be shown Dumbo with free popcorn.

SECOND READING/ADOPTION

TOWNSHIP OF LONG HILL ORDINANCE # 441-19

AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING COMMERCIAL CANVASSERS, SOLICITORS AND PEDDLERS AND AMENDING SECTION 4-3 OF THE TOWNSHIP CODE

WHEREAS, the Township must amend its solicitor ordinance to bring it into compliance

with several recent court decisions;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the

Township of Long Hill in the County of Morris, State of New Jersey, that Chapter IV of the

Township Code entitled "General Licensing" is hereby supplemented and amended as follows:

Section 1. Section 4-3 of the Township Code entitled "Canvassers, Solicitors, and

Peddlers" is hereby amended to read as follows:

4-3 CANVASSERS, SOLICITORS, AND PEDDLERS.

4-3.1 Commercial Canvassers, Solicitors and Peddlers.

a. *Permit Required.* No person, firm or corporation shall canvass, solicit, distribute circulars or other matter or call from house to house in the Township of Long Hill to sell, promote the sale of or attempt to sell goods by sample or to take or attempt to take orders for the future delivery of goods, merchandise, wares or any property, personal or real, of any nature whatsoever, or take or attempt to take orders for services to be furnished or performed presently or in the future without first having obtained a written permit therefor from the Police Department of the Township of Long Hill. In the case of a firm or corporation, a permit shall be required for each individual who is to conduct such activities.

b. Exemptions.

1. Any person engaging in religious proselytizing, anonymous political speech or the distribution of political or religious handbills or circulars or any person, firm or corporation canvassing or soliciting on behalf of a bona fide religious, charitable or political organization shall be subject to the permitted hours of operation set forth in paragraph c. of subsection 4-3.3 below, but shall be exempt from all other provisions of this section. Such persons or groups, however, must give twenty-four (24)-hours' notice to the Police Department advising the department of the dates, times and neighborhoods in which they will be canvassing or soliciting.

As used in this section, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

Bona fide religious, charitable, educational or political organization shall mean any organization that is qualified under State or Federal law as a tax exempt, nonprofit organization or any organization or group that espouses or advocates a position or belief on any subject of public interest or on behalf of any candidate for public office.

Canvass shall mean to call upon persons to elicit or determine opinions, feelings, sentiments or information of any nature.

Solicit shall mean to call upon persons to seek donations or contributions to such bona fide religious, charitable, educational or political organizations.

2. Candidates for Political Office Exempt. Any candidate for public office or person campaigning on behalf of such a candidate, where such candidate is seeking election to an office to be voted upon by the residents of the Township of Long Hill who are duly

registered to vote in elections in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey, shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

3. Any person, firm or corporation delivering goods or performing services which have previously been ordered by the person owning, leasing or occupying the property where such delivery is made, or service performed shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

4. Any person, firm or corporation calling upon or soliciting from commercial establishments located in the Township of Long Hill shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

5. Any minor employed by a newspaper as a carrier, who has been issued a minor's carrier permit pursuant to N.J.S.A. 34:2-21.15 and who has been previously registered with the Police Department by the employing newspaper, shall be exempt from the requirements of this section.

6. Any person engaging in any activity found by the Federal or State courts to be exempt from the requirements of obtaining a permit under this section.

c. *Application*.

1. The application form for a permit under this section shall require the following information:

- (a) Name of the applicant.
- (b) Permanent home address.
- (c) Temporary address.
- (d) Name and address and telephone number of the employer or firm represented.
- (e) Place or places of residence of the applicant for the preceding three (3) years.
- (f) Date on which soliciting or canvassing is to commence and end.

(g) Nature of goods or merchandise to be sold or offered for sale or the nature of the services to be furnished.

(h) Whether the applicant has been convicted of a crime, disorderly persons offense or violation of any ordinance relating to canvassing or soliciting and, if so, when, where, and the nature of the offense.

(i) The names of other municipalities in New Jersey where the applicant has been issued a permit to solicit in the past two (2) years.

(j) Whether any motor vehicle will be used in connection with the canvassing or soliciting and, if so, the make, year, color, type and license plate number.

- (k) Physical description of the applicant.
- 2. The application shall be accompanied by a letter or other written statement from the

individual, firm or corporation employing the applicant certifying that the applicant is authorized to act as the representative of the individual, firm or corporation.

3. All applicants under this section shall be fingerprinted and photographed by the Long Hill Township Police Department.

d. *Permit Fee; Term.* Each applicant for a permit shall pay the fee of twenty (\$20.00) dollars for an annual permit. In the case of a firm or corporation, a permit shall be required for each individual who is to conduct such activities. The permit shall expire on December 31 of each year, and no permit fee shall be prorated for part of a year. (Ord. No. 147-04 § 1)

4-3.2 Administration; Regulations.

a. Administration.

1. Any person, firm or corporation seeking a permit to canvass or solicit shall file an application with the Long Hill Township Police Department on a form supplied by the Department. The application shall include the names and addresses of all persons who will be soliciting or canvassing on behalf of the applicant along with a certification by the applicant that it has conducted a background check on all of those persons and none of them has been convicted of any of the following crimes and offenses:

a. A crime or offense bearing upon or involving a sexual offense or child molestation or endangering the welfare of children or incompetents.

b. A crime or offense within the last twenty (20) years involving the manufacture, transportation, sale, possession or habitual use of a "controlled dangerous substance" as defined in the New Jersey Controlled Dangerous Substance Act, N.J.S.A. 2C:35-1, et seq.

c. A crime or offense involving the use of force or the threat of force to or upon a person or property including armed robbery, assault, kidnapping, arson, manslaughter and murder.

d. A crime or offense involving theft and related offenses or forgery and fraudulent practices under Chapters 26 or 27 of the Title 2C of the New Jersey Statutes.

2. The Long Hill Township Police Department shall accept applications for processing only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. No applications shall be processed on weekends or holidays.

b. Issuance of Permits. The Long Hill Township Police Chief or his designee shall ordinarily act on all applications within forty-eight (48) hours after submission of a complete application. Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall be excluded from such computation. If the Police Chief or his designee feels that the application should be denied, then the application shall be submitted to the Township Committee in accordance with the provisions of paragraph f. below. The Long Hill Township Police department shall issue a Permit within 48 hours of a complete application that satisfies all of the requirements set forth in paragraph "a" above.

c. *Permitted Hours of Peddling, Soliciting and Canvassing*. Peddling, soliciting and canvassing shall be allowed only between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

d. *Display of Permit*. Each permittee shall be issued a permit which shall be prominently displayed upon the person of the permittee whenever such permittee is engaged in canvassing or soliciting.

e. *Permit Not Transferable*. No permit shall be transferable. In the case of a firm or corporation, each person representing such firm or corporation shall be issued a separate permit.

f. Action by Chief of Police Regarding Revocation, Denial or Suspension of Permit.

1. In any case where, in the opinion of the Chief of Police or his designee, a permit should be revoked or should not be issued, the Chief shall immediately forward such matter to the Township Committee for its consideration. Such transmittal shall include the application together with supporting data and information and the reasons which form the basis of his recommendation for revocation or denial. The Township Committee may deny or revoke a permit where it finds the applicant or permittee has failed to comply with any of the provisions of this section or has been convicted of a crime, disorderly person's offense or ordinance violation which relates adversely to the activity for which the permit has or would be issued.

2. In cases where a permit is subject to revocation for any reason provided for in this section, the Chief of Police may temporarily suspend such permit, pending consideration of the matter by the Township Committee.

Section 2. Any and all other ordinances or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with any of the terms hereof are hereby repealed to such extent as they are so in conflict or inconsistent.

Section 3. In case any article, section or provision of this ordinance shall be held

invalid in any court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect any other article, section

or provision of this ordinance except insofar as the article, section or provision so declared

invalid shall be inseparable from the remainder or any portion thereof.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and

publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF LONG HILL, IN THE COUNTY OF MORRIS, NEW JERSEY, APPROVING AN AGREEMENT OF SALE BETWEEN THE TOWNSHIP AND NEW JERSEY AMERICAN WATER COMPANY, INC. FOR THE SALE OF THE TOWNSHIP'S WASTEWATER SYSTEM AND AUTHORIZING A PROPOSAL TO BE PRINTED ON THE BALLOT FOR CONSIDERATION BY THE VOTERS WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 5, 2019 PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF THE **TOWNSHIP'S** WASTEWATER SYSTEM TO NEW **JERSEY** AMERICAN WATER COMPANY, INC.

WHEREAS, the Township of Long Hill, in the County of Morris, New Jersey (the "Township") currently owns and operates a wastewater system servicing the residents and property owners (the "Customers") within the geographic boundaries of the Township (the "System"); and

WHEREAS, the Township has determined that is in the best interest of such Customers within the Township to sell the System to an entity with experience and expertise

in owning and operating such systems in order to meet all necessary demands associated with such System including all present and future requirements of various state and federal regulatory agencies and to make necessary capital improvements to the System; and

WHEREAS, the Township prepared and distributed a Request for Bids for the Sale of the Wastewater System (the "RFB") dated April 18, 2019 requesting bids for the purchase of the System pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:62-1 <u>et seq.</u> (the "Public Utilities Law"); and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2019 the Township received one bid from a regulated water and wastewater company, New Jersey American Water Company, Inc., to purchase the Township's System; and

WHEREAS, based on the review of the above referenced bid, the Township has determined that the bid submitted by New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. in the amount of \$12,700,000 was the highest responsible (and only) bid; and

WHEREAS, under the terms of the RFB, the Township would sell all of the Township's rights and interests in the land and improvements comprising the System, provided that any purchaser of the System would continue to provide wastewater treatment services to the Customers in accordance with all applicable state and local standards, make all capital improvements necessary to lift the existing sewer ban, and meet other requirements set forth in the RFB; and

WHEREAS, the Township and New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. have agreed to the terms of the sale of the System; and

WHEREAS, the Public Utilities Law requires that in addition to the approval of the Township, the legal voters of the Township must also approve the sale of the System; and

WHEREAS, the Public Utilities Law, specifically N.J.S.A. 40:62-5, authorizes the Township to request that the clerk of the County of Morris place the question of the sale of the System on the ballot used at the next general election in the Township, which is scheduled for November 5, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Township desires to enter into the Agreement of Sale, subject to the approval of the voters of the Township as set forth in N.J.S.A. 40:62-5 and any other regulatory approvals set forth in the Public Utilities Law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Committee of the Township of Long Hill, County of Morris, State of New Jersey, as follows:

SECTION I

The recitals are hereby incorporated as if set forth in full herein.

SECTION II

The Township hereby approves the sale of the System to New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. for \$12,700,000 in accordance with its bid and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the RFB and the Agreement of Sale, subject to the approval of the voters of the Township as set forth in N.J.S.A. 40:62-5.

SECTION III

The Agreement of Sale between the Township and New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. entitled "Agreement of Sale between the Township of Long Hill, New Jersey and New Jersey American Water Company, Inc." substantially in the form on file in the office of the Township Clerk, is hereby approved with such further changes, insertions and amendments as deemed necessary by the Township Committee, in consultation with the Township staff and professionals. The approval of this Agreement of Sale is subject to compliance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40:62-5 of the Public Utilities Law.

SECTION IV

The Township Committee and all other appropriate officials of the Township are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Agreement of Sale and any other documents deemed necessary to effectuate the terms of this Ordinance and to proceed with the regulatory process and approvals required under the provisions of the Agreement of Sale and the Public Utilities Law subject to approval of the sale by the voters of the Township pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:62-5.

SECTION V

The Township Committee hereby requests and directs the Clerk of the County of Morris to place the following question and explanation on the ballot of the next general election, such to be substantially in the form provided in N.J.S.A. 40:62-5 as follows:

PROPOSAL

"Shall the Township of Long Hill, in the County of Morris, New Jersey, be authorized to sell its wastewater system to New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. for the sum of \$12,700,000?"

Explanation

If a majority of the legal voters in the Township vote "yes", the Township of Long Hill will sign an agreement of sale with New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. for the wastewater system servicing the residents and property owners within the geographic boundaries of the Township in the amount of \$12,700,000. This agreement provides that New Jersey American Water Company, Inc. will provide and maintain all wastewater services to the existing customers of the

Township's wastewater system and will make substantial capital improvements to such system in accordance with the terms of the Agreement of Sale approved by the Township. The service rates to the customers of the Township's System will be subject to approval by the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities from time to time.

SECTION VI

This Ordinance shall take effect as provided by law.

The people have spoken and the Committee should not try a run around their vote. He also asked and was answered as to what would happen if the vote failed again? The Mayor replied that the contract with Veolia was for 10 years so the Committee would be unable to go to referendum without breaking that contract.
- 2) Pam Ogens questioned the offer price from NJAW and the amount of money the Township had already put into the wastewater system.
- 3) Neil Lorber requested and the Committee agreed to amend the language of the proposal and referendum question as they had last time to include the phrase "commonly known as the sanitary sewer system"
- 4) Charles Arentowicz recommended the Committee did not pass this Ordinance.
